BEETHOVEN'S 9TH SYMPHONY



Imagine this: a full house, a standing ovation, 170 musicians on the stage — the musicians are ecstatic about the music and the reception, management is ecstatic about the music and the ticket sales, the volunteers are ecstatic about the music and the chance to rest, and the 970 audience members are ecstatic about the music.

The Barrier Reef Orchestra (BRO) reached a new high on Tuesday 16 August 2011 with the successful production of this challenging major work. In addition to the 62 orchestra members, the performance involved the Spirit of the Voice choirs, including adults and children. In describing this event, Simon McConnell, who was president of the BRO at that time, wrote:

> Logistically, the Beethoven's 9th Symphony is very demanding and is rarely played outside metropolitan centres and even more rarely played by community orchestras. This challenge involved drawing musicians from other centres (Adelaide, Brisbane, Canberra and Sydney), retaining a conductor from England, and engaging four vocal soloists (Mackay, Brisbane).

> This was a very special orchestral and choral event for Townsville. I'm told it is most musicians' ambition to perform the 9th Symphony and to enable this took approximately 15,000 volunteer hours in practice, rehearsal, organisation and promotion. It was a great triumph for all involved and a rare opportunity for audience members to hear this great work live in a regional city.
